"Easter is God's declaration that love has the last word and that there really are only three things that last: faith, hope and love. Easter, the fourth day of the Paschal Mystery, is God's affirmation that there really is no limit to love's forbearance, to its trust, its hope, its power to endure.

Easter is the felt knowledge of Julian of Norwich's poetic prayer: 'All shall be well, All shall be well, All manner of thing shall be well."

In this summer issue of the *HM Voice* you will read about the combined 1,065 years of commitment of our Jubilarians, those who have lived and served witnessing to the truth that "love has the last word." They are an inspiration to us all.

Please enjoy stories of the HM legacy of hospitality that endures at the Villa to this day. So many of you have been a part of our legacy and story in one way or another. Sharing our lives with you is our joy, and counting on your prayers and support is its own inspiration. Please know you are in our daily thoughts and prayers with abiding gratitude. ### Villa Hospitality Runs on H.E.A.R.T.

Ever since Mother Madelaine opened her home as a workroom and school for women and girls in her small French village, hospitality has been at the core of the HM identity. The spirit of that hospitality followed those early pioneer sisters across the ocean to take root in western Pennsylvania as they established a home on the property that has become Villa Maria.

Nursing their sick neighbors, welcoming orphans into their care, establishing a school on their grounds, and creating an infirmary for injured railroad workers are just some of the ways the HM Sisters showed their hospitality to their local community in those early days.

This legacy lives on as the sisters welcome retreatants and other groups to their home to share the spiritual nourishment it provides.

The seeds of hospitality continue to flourish today beyond the sisters through everyone who comes in contact with them—especially those who work at Villa Maria and carry on the sisters' mission. These employees extend the sisters' hospitality to all who visit the Villa's sacred spaces with

the Villa core values of H.E.A.R.T.— Hospitality, Excellence, Appreciation, Respect, and Teamwork.

"When the Bon Secours Mercy

That love and hospitality take many forms on the Villa campus: smiling faces on the food service line in the dining room, around the hallways, and at reception desks; menus that are planned with great care for nutritional needs and meals prepared with loving hands; and public and private spaces around the campus that are tended to with meticulous precision.

These small acts by staff create that loving atmosphere that is apparent to campus visitors.

Dominick Commisso, hospitality coordinator at Villa Maria Education and Spirituality Center (VMESC), takes care of the many groups that attend retreats and programs on campus. Dom began his career working in the kitchen for Cura Hospitality, the contracted company that provides food service for the campus.

"I've been here now for seven years," said Dom. "I started with dishwashing, line serving, and just any extra kitchen help they may have needed. Then in 2019, I came down to VMESC. I was thinking about leaving the kitchen at that time, so Matt [Abramowski, former VMESC

program director] asked me to come down here to help him out with whatever the groups may need."

Dom was hired on as a hospitality associate, a position he held until 2021 when he became part time hospitality coordinator. In October 2021, he became full time hospitality coordinator when a former staff member left VMESC. Among his many duties are taking care of group check-ins and checkouts, doing room checks and setups, and focusing on that hospitality core with whatever the group's needs are—from the smallest detail to the overall experience.

"Dom has a delightful presence and conveys the spirit we have and the spirit we extend to all who visit," said Sr. Carol Anne.

"It's the core of the sisters here and that's the mission." Dom said when asked about the importance of hospitality at the Villa. "I firmly believe that because it just makes guests feel so welcome here. It makes them feel at ease. I really try to carry that forward with the groups, whether that's one-on-one, as a whole, or even just with the sisters or employees. I take it very seriously. I got to know a lot of groups throughout my time here from the kitchen, and a lot of the groups do remember me from when I worked there."

Food is another important aspect of hospitality on the Villa campus. "It is the number one thing to bring everybody together," said Stacy Julian of Cura Hospitality. Stacy, who has worked at the Villa for nearly ten

years, is administrative assistant to the food service director.

Cura Hospitality (previously called Aladdin) has been providing food service to the Villa since 2005 when the sisters decided to contract an outside company to take over operation of the kitchen.

Tom Jacobs, who became food service director at the Villa in October 2021. has been working in food service his entire career. Although fairly new to the Villa, he was glad to get back to this type of work.

"I like this type of service where you take care of one group of people over time and get to know what their needs and wants are," Tom said. "Our goal is to always take it to the next step for the sisters and the residents and

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staff—to constantly try to improve and give them better food, better service, and so on. Hospitality is very important. There's such an amazing past here, and the culture is one of the most unique items. We try to embrace that and not just be a separate company within. I think the staff feels they are part of the family. They take pride in taking care of sisters, staff, and residents, and they have a lot of passion for it, which I think is an extension of the sisters' passion for not only their home, but their history and their culture."

"The staff that we have down in the kitchen—they know why they're here," added Stacy. "They know that this is the sisters' home, and we are here to provide a service to them within that scope. Whatever we can do. They want their guests to be

welcome, and we want to present good quality meals because that's a reflection of them."

In the spirit of reflecting HM values, Tom implemented a Cura program called "Waste Nothing" in February 2022. The program puts emphasis on the preparation of ingredients and the use of leftovers in other meals to cut down on food waste. Nonedibles, with the exception of meat byproducts, are sent to Villa Maria Farm for composting.

"I felt the program fit the culture of the sisters," Tom said. "The first few weeks [after implementing the program] we had to take away the trash cans while everyone learned how to prepare the items. I had to analyze what they did and tell them how to get more off a particular item, but the staff are so good at it now. Anything that can't be used in a different recipe is sent to the farm for composting. We log everything in pounds daily, and our average day is about 16 pounds of waste that goes to the farm."

The sisters also compost on their resident floors and Tom said that Cura delivers that to the farm as well.

Other Cura programs that have been implemented at the Villa are providing infused water stations at several locations around campus, which helps promote a welcoming atmosphere for guests, and the Be Well program, which features samples of a dietitian developed recipe once a month.

"What makes the Villa different from other sites is you feel like you're at home," Tom said. "The staff are not just here working for people; they're

making an effort to be a part of the history. There's a lot of heart in it."

Also putting a lot of heart into their work is the environmental services department. The invisible work they do is yet another facet of Villa hospitality.

Keeping up with the demands of such a large campus requires careful planning and attention to detail. Mary Taylor, environmental services manager, runs a seven-day-a-week operation to tackle just that. She and her staff take care of the buildings

on campus, making sure the Villa's public and private spaces are clean, organized, and comfortable.

"Everybody has their areas that they take care of," said Mary. "We keep things clean and disinfected and also take care of the laundry. We take care of the guest rooms and the sisters' rooms as well as the common spaces. With Villa Maria Commons opening, we are training on those floors as well."

groupings in various spaces around the Villa campus. These spaces create a comfortable atmosphere for the sisters to gather together, for guests to relax in while on retreat, or for small groups to have a bit of privacy while visiting campus.

Environmental services staff also greet guests and other retreatants they come across as they go about their duties.

"Since we're here seven days a week, we interact with guests that are here visiting or on retreat," Mary said. "We always make sure to greet everyone we see, and make their experience here a good one. I couldn't do my job without my staff, and I really appreciate all their hard work. They make me look good."

So in this sometimes-inhospitable world, don't be afraid to follow the example of Mother Madelaine and reach out your hand in welcome. A small act of kindness can make a world of difference.



#### Statue of St. Joseph


This statue of St. Joseph is located on the north side of the Activities building, aka the gym for the former Villa Maria High School. St. Joseph is a primary and special patron for the HM Community. Mother Madelaine Potier found great solace in praying to St. Joseph, the patron of a happy death. Our priest founder generally signed his name "Rev. J. Joseph Begel" to emphasize his devotion to his patron saint. The first school at the Villa was "St. Joseph School" and the infirmary for the railroad workers was also named after the patron saint of workers.



#### **Our Lady of Lourdes** and St. Bernadette

This sculptured rendering celebrating Our Lady of Lourdes and St. Bernadette is located on the wall of an outdoor porch near Magnificat Chapel. It can be seen from the hallway near the Villa library. At one time this stone sculpture was in one single piece, but many years ago it fell from its original location and injured one of the sisters. Its new home was determined to be a safer location, yet one where the art can still be viewed.

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#### Image of Mary in Metal

Located on the south wall in the Zen Garden between the Administration building and the outdoor porch, this artistic rendering of Our Lady adds to the serenity of the space. During construction of the Conference Center (summer of 2003 until summer of 2004), many of the construction workers on the project chose this location for their breaks and lunch.

Each Wednesday morning, a vibrant, courageous, prayerful group of sisters gather with open minds, willing hands, and healthy curiosity.

Art and Prayer Meditation sessions facilitated by Sr. Colleen Ungashick, have been an offered activity in Villa Maria Commons since 2017. The hour-long gathering is an invitation for sisters to come together, pray, and create. No art experience is necessary and all are welcome. Each sister who participates takes away a beautiful piece of artwork, satisfaction gained from engaging in the process, usually a smile, and always a word of gratitude. "I look forward to this

time!" said Sr. Marguerite Holz of her participation in the sessions.

An array of projects includes seasonal collage, Celtic cross inspired paper mosaic, assembling wreaths from a variety of materials, painting and embellishing on wood, clay pinch pots, colored tissue paper sun-catchers, watercolor on wood, handmade Christmas ornaments, and decoupage. Many resulting art pieces are exhibit-worthy!

More precious, even, than the final product is the shared time and conversation, and the process of learning and creating. Art, like music, is healthy for the brain! Mind, body, and spirit are nourished. An individual engaging in creative expression may experience a spiritual state akin to meditation—with

Through their ministries and in their prayers, they have witnessed God's love to the people of God and have touched many lives along the way.

#### 25 Years



Sister Mary Stanco was born March 29. 1967, to Pauline and Richard Stanco, the youngest of eight children. She is

an aunt to 18 nieces and nephews, and as of November 2022, a great aunt to a grandniece.

She entered the HM Community on October 20, 1996, as a candidate from St. Bernadette Church in Westlake. Ohio; she made perpetual vows in 2004. Prior to entering the community, she graduated from Magnificat High School, Rocky River, Ohio, in 1985 and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in English with a minor in Theology from St. Bonaventure University, and a master's degree in library and information science from the University of Pittsburgh. She worked at Cleveland State University Law Library as a librarian prior to entering the community.

Once in the community, Sr. Mary ministered at St Colman's Church in Cleveland with the Sisters of St. Joseph and the St. Vincent de Paul Society outreach. She graduated in 2003 from Case Western Reserve's Mandel School of Social Science Management of Nonprofit Organization master's program. Upon graduation from Case she ministered with Humility of Mary Housing, Inc. (HMHI).

Sr. Mary worked with Cobalt, Inc. for the Mandel Foundation's Neighborhood Leadership Development Program and the Sisters of Charity Foundation in 2007, and then went on to serve as a regional site director for Notre Dame Mission Volunteer-AmeriCorps in Baltimore from 2009-2012 where she oversaw young adult volunteers in New York City, Rochester, N.Y., and Washington D.C. She served as the Director of Humility of Mary Volunteer Service from 2012-2018 where she ministered with young adult volunteers and service sites serving the needs of families who were migrant workers and immigrants in Immokalee, Fla.; Miami; Cleveland; and Youngstown. She also ministered collaboratively with the Ursuline Sisters of Youngstown's volunteer program and nationally with Catholic Volunteer Network.

In 2019 Sr. Mary accepted a position with the Leadership Collaborative, an organization that was formed by religious communities for emergent servant leadership development of religious sisters, associates, and partners in ministry. She is currently enrolled in a coaching program with the Benedictine Sisters of Pittsburgh

to become a certified life coach. In 2022, she accepted a position as the Executive Director of Women of Providence in Collaboration, where she ministers with sisters from ten Providence communities from the United States and Canada.

When I started my novitiate 25 years ago, my life became a part of 150 years plus of the Sisters of the Humility of Mary who have responded to the needs of the times with faith, hope and love with the people of God. Each day I pray these words "... God is faithful, hope is a way of life and love brings about peace and justice." The words from the HM Constitutions are a response to remain faithful to the abiding presence of God in the world, to live out of hope through my prayer life and be able to seek with others in community and ministry a common ground of love and forgiveness. It has been more than 25 years of listening as I ministered to many stories of joy and pain. It is in many encounters with others and in relationship to my family that I have come to understand what it is to respond to the gospel. I have been grateful as in the words from Dag Hammarskjold's Markings, "To remain a recipient out of humility. And preserve your flexibility. To remain a recipient and be grateful. Grateful for being allowed to listen, to observe, to understand." As the community celebrates with me 25 years we will proclaim "...my soul magnifies the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God My Savior. For God has done great things for me and holy is God's name." This is proclaimed as Mary greets Elizabeth. A relationship of two women of different generations, sharing their faith in God, entrust in giving and receiving, a love that speaks of God's love for each of us. I have been incredibly blessed to be able to be part of this intergenerational experience as an HM as well as part of sisters from many different communities through Giving Voice and the Leadership Collaborative as we journey together to unfold all that God has called us to in this day and age.

As a Magnificat High School student, **Sister** Kathleen **McIntyre** loved the Blue Nuns who taught there.

After graduation she entered the HM Community September 12, 1962, from St. Patrick [Westpark] Parish in Cleveland.Ten months later she received the traditional blue habit and the religious name Sister Ann Maureen. After professing first vows she attended Ursuline College where she studied English and Spanish in preparation to teach in secondary education, graduating in 1968.

Her first teaching assignments were at Magnificat and Canton Central Catholic. She later attended the University of Akron, earning her Master's degree in counseling in 1977. During her graduate studies she worked with the university's Peer Tutoring Program. Upon completion of her degree Sr. Kathleen remained at the university as a counselor and coordinator of the Tutoring Program. She loved the students and the wide diversity and especially loved working with student-athletes. She developed a deep love for Black students and their families and was especially honored by the Black Student Union, which awarded her the "Extra Miler Award." After 25 years at the University of Akron, she retired. However, she continued to teach or tutor part-time at three Akron Catholic high schools particularly supporting Black and Hispanic students.



Sister Susan **Schorsten** entered the HM Community from St. Louis Parish, Louisville, and Canton Central Catholic. As she

reflects on her 60+ years as an HM Sister her heart is filled with gratitude to God for God's abundant love and mercy. God has invited her through the years with multiple 'annunciations' to which she has responded with a 'yes' - sometimes with a resounding 'yes' and at others with "are you sure you know what you are doing God?"

She has been blessed in so many ways ministering in health care, diocesan social ministry, leadership, consultation with other religious communities, and retreat work. She owes so much to the wonderful people with whom she has shared ministry, who challenged her and shared with her their gifts and blessings.

### Villa Sisters Spotlight

Catholic Sisters don't retire, they merely change ministries. In this issue, we highlight two more "retired" sisters living at the Villa and the ways they are still serving and listening to where God is calling them.

#### Sr. Rose Huber

Sr. Rose Huber retired from active ministry in 2018 after serving for 56 years as an educator, religious education director, minister to the hearing impaired, chaplain, and pastoral minister in four states. Born in Maryland, she entered the Sisters of Notre Dame before transferring to the Sisters of the Humility of Mary in 1970.

She began her years of active ministry serving in elementary education in the Cleveland, Ohio area. When she moved to Stone Mountain, Ga., to serve as a director of religious education, Sr. Rose encountered something that changed her. One of

the students in her class was hearingimpaired and had an interpreter, which introduced Sr. Rose to sign language. She began learning it herself and joined an interpretative choir at her parish that was started by the mother of that hearing-impaired child.

Sr. Rose polished her sign language skills at the Catholic Office for the Deaf in the Pittsburgh Diocese and began serving the hearing-impaired community and their families in the Diocese of Trenton, N.J. at the Marie Katzenback School for the Deaf in the early 1980s. While ministering there, she developed a video of religious signs and prayers that could be used as a teaching tool called "Signs of Praise."

She felt called by God to begin working in prison ministry in 1990 and served as a chaplain at the Albert C. Wagner Correctional Institution in Bordentown, N.J., for 17 years. Her memories of ministering in the men's state prison system remain with her to this day.

"I will never forget, after passing security, the chilling sound of the heavy metal doors when you first set foot inside the prison," said Sr. Rose. "Here I found so many young men who had been from dysfunctional

families, separated from loved ones, isolated and unloved. Yet there was within each one so much hidden potential and giftedness. The presence of God was needed. I tried to bring compassion, love, and hope."

After leaving prison ministry, Sr. Rose returned to Ohio and served as pastoral minister at Holy Apostles Parish in Youngstown. There she also volunteered serving meals at the Community Kitchen, delivered donations to the Dorothy Day House, and served for five years as a volunteer police chaplain with the Youngstown Police Department. She left the volunteer position with the YPD to minister as a chaplain at Northside Medical Center in Youngstown until its closure in 2018.

Activities at the Villa keep her busy these days, and she does a lot of phone and letter outreach. She also crochets items for donation as part of the Prayer Shawl ministry. Sr. Rose enjoys meeting residents of Villa Maria Apartments and greeting guests that attend various VMESC programs. In addition, she prays daily for the HM Associate Community, the JOY participants, and the Young Adult Ministry.

"I like meeting people, trying to build a relationship, and just helping them where they are," she said. "I have tried to see the face of God in every person. In looking back, I am filled with gratitude to my parents and all those faith-filled people that have supported me on my life's journey. Now, I am grateful and blessed to live here at Villa Maria and to be able to witness God's love."

#### Sr. Barbara Lenarcic

Sr. Barbara Lenarcic's journey to becoming an HM Sister was not the "typical" path to religious life. She had no prior connection with the community as she had been taught by the Sisters of St. Joseph in elementary school and the Cleveland Ursulines in high school.

"It was pure Holy Spirit," said Sr. Barbara. "I entered late—what was considered late at the time. I had worked as a secretary and sang with various orchestras in Cleveland. When I was 25, I had just come back from touring with the Warren Covington-Tommy Dorsey Band and started to attend church again. In

confession the priest said to me, 'are you sure you don't have a religious vocation?' I thought he was crazy, but he just happened to be the brother of Sr. Rita Costello, HM [deceased]. That planted the seed and then I met Sr. Maria Crucis Polk, HM [deceased] and she became my mentor in a way."

Sr. Barbara ministered in primary education for 14 years before becoming director of religious education for several parishes in the Cleveland and Youngstown dioceses. It was while serving as a pastoral minister at a parish in Erie that she decided to pursue the education to become a counselor.

"When I was pastoral minister people were beginning to talk to me, and I was trying to help them," Sr. Barbara said. "I thought it would be good to go back to school because that is a switch [from pastoral ministry to professional counseling]."

She served as a professional counselor, therapist, and spiritual director for 12 years before returning to Villa Maria Community Center,

where she became part of the retreat team and a spiritual director at Villa Maria Education and Spirituality Center (VMESC). Sr. Barbara ministered at VMESC until 2018 when she retired from active ministry.

Now, Sr. Barbara loves to spend time in conversation with other sisters as she finds it very soul enriching. She also enjoys doing art, which has been a life-long passion.

"I've been doing art all my life. When I was 12 years old, my mother took me to the Cleveland Art Museum every Saturday for lessons, and I remember going outside and picking an object and drawing that. I find satisfaction in it—to be able to express myself through art. I find that it helps me in my prayer life as well to be able to let that creativity come out, which is totally in the presence of God."




